You can rest assured that our distinguished representatives in Springfield are diligently working to protect and serve the citizens of our fair state. As a matter of fact, they may have focused too much of their energy on bicycle matters, and not left enough time for more mundane matters, such as, balancing a budget. Anyway, there are some exciting new laws that are effective in 2018

In the past, it was a legal requirement to have a reflector on the back of the bike when riding at night. Now it is permissible to have a light instead of a reflector. I do not believe that the law states whether the light must be in the blink or no-blink mode. Upon learning of this statute, most riders have responded with, "Duh".

Another bicycle law pertains to vehicle drivers. With no head-on traffic, it is now permissible to cross over a double yellow line in order to give a cyclist three feet when passing. Personally I think that this is good. But I also think that there are drivers, who in their seventy or so years of driving experience, have never crossed a double yellow line. And probably won't start now. So you still got to be careful out there

## **Jessica and Bob Go Glamping with Bikes**

We are glamping on Chokoloskee Island, 3 miles south of Everglades City, 7 miles south of the intersection of Florida 29 and the Tamiami Trail (highway 41). Hundreds of alligators and thousands of birds and snakes live in the canals that were dug to provide material for the construction of routes 41 and 29. An 11 mile bike ride will take you to the Fakahatchee State Park ranger station, and then on for miles into the Everglades. Chokoloskee has an RV park, a trailer park, some old buildings and is basically a fishing village.

It is a shell island, which means it was literally created from the shells that were discarded over thousands of years by the native Americans who lived in the area. A road from the mainland to Chokoloskee was completed in 1955.

It's a fascinating area, and particularly comfortable to visit right now before mosquito season hits. — *Jessica and Bob Disbrow*

## Jim and Jan Go Bicycling the Gulf Stream

Of course you can't actually cycle the Gulf Stream which comes up the east coast of Mexico under Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, around Florida and up the coast of South Carolina. It was used by the Spaniards to bring their gold from South America to Spain.

We merely used it as an excuse to get south for a few weeks and provide research for all of you. Now you can ride your bikes next winter without leaving North America.

Driving straight south on January 13, 2018, we left snow and ice behind by mid-Mississippi. Our first ride was the "Longleaf Trace", a rail to trail from Prentiss to Hattiesburg (44 miles). We rode from Sumrall to Enis, a great trail with interesting small towns. Of course, we always had to ride back to our starting points.



Next we camped at Shepard State Park near Gautier, MS, to ride bike trails on a scenic road with no shoulder.

Our third intended ride was the 8 mile trail the entire length of Dauphin Island near Mobile, Alabama. Unfortunately, 22 degree at night and 35 degree daytime with 25 mph wind from the north discouraged our ride. We toured Ft. Stuart and an Audubon Park nearby on foot. Both were very enjoyable. If you get good weather we highly recommend the trail.

Two trails we passed up were the "Mississippi River Trail" along the entire western border of Mississippi and the "Natchez Trace" from Tennessee to Natchez, Mississippi.

Now going east along the Gulf we rode the Blackwater Heritage State Trail out of Milton, Florida. It's 9 miles long plus a military trail to a Naval Air Station gate, plus 8 more miles on an empty road recommended by a local bike shop. 25 miles Rail to Trail.

Continuing east we rode out of Falling Water State Park. The trail led right out of the park to Chipley, Florida along Alternate Route 77. We missed the Timpoochee Trail (19 miles) on the Emerald Coast at South Walton which winds through 12 beach towns in the panhandle, due to weather.

We did ride the Tallahassee/St. Mark Heritage Trail (16 miles — a "Rail to Trail"). A new 9 mile county trail is almost complete as an addition. Highly recommended.

The Nature Coast State Trail (31+ miles) runs from Chiefland to Cross City. Manatee Springs State Park is near by (6 miles). Fanning Springs State Park is astride the Trail and has cabins to rent but no camping. We saw Manatees 15 feet away from the dock. Florida is full of State Parks with good biking trails.

Jan and I will continue this report on our Gulf Coast research in the next newsletter as our Editor has pressured us to cough up



this information. We are available for further interrogation but are presently at Hunting Island State Park in South Carolina near Beaufort after leaving Savannah today (February 6, 2018).
